

I am deeply honoured to have presided the JBACE in 2006-2007, a momentous year during which significant progress and achievements were accomplished on many issues prioritized by the Committee. First among these and in relation to its role pertaining to the supervision of the assessment and review procedure, the Committee acted on the recommendations established in the previous year regarding the application of the procedure to Category I lands. Indeed, a meeting with the Grand Chief of the Crees, Mr. Mathew Mukash, allowed the parties to discuss how the Cree Regional Authority could collaborate toward the implementation of these recommendations.

In other respects, the JBACE has undertaken a review of Schedules 1 and 2 of Section 22 of the JBNQA, namely the lists of projects subjected or exempted from the assessment and review procedure. This is no mean feat given that, despite a provision in the JBNQA recommending their re-examination every five years, no serious review of these lists has been undertaken since the signing of the Agreement in 1975. The work undertaken will allow the Committee to submit to the signatories draft amendments of these lists sometime during the first few months of the next financial year.

And in the area of integrated residual materials management, the establishment of a working group comprised of representatives of the Service des matières résiduelles of the Ministère du Développement durable, de l'Environnement et des Parcs augurs well for the implementation of sustainable solutions for the James Bay Territory. The working group has visited a number of locations on the Territory in order to assure itself of the feasibility of the measures being contemplated. In this respect, members of the group were greatly inspired by the leadership exercised by the community of Wemindji which launched its own recycling program of residual materials and this, without the support of any government program. It is worthwhile mentioning that the JBACE, in 2005, had collaborated in this initiative through the hiring of interns.

Land use planning and, in particular, the lack of coordination between the measures applied thereto, remain a source of concern for the JBACE. I truly hope that our interventions with the Ministère des Ressources naturelles et de la Faune and with the Standing Liaison Committee will result in a land use planning more in line with the principles of the environmental and social protection regime, in particular as concerns Native participation.

I would take this opportunity to express my gratitude to my colleagues Mrs. Ginette Lajoie of the CRA and Mr. Guy Demers, the Government of Québec representative, for their considered support on the Administrative Committee and their involvement in following up on the Committee's initiatives. I would also express my gratitude to all of the members for their precious collaboration.

USE REGULATIONS.



The JBACE may recommend changes to make proposed laws and regulations compatible with the guiding principles of the regime set forth in Section 22 of the JBNQA. These principles, provide for, among other things, special status and involvement of the Cree people.

COOPER DIGITAL PRODUCTIONS

One of the roles of the James Bay Advisory Committee on the Environment (JBACE) under the James Bay and Northern Québec Agreement (JBNQA) is to advise the responsible governments¹ on the administration of the environmental and social protection regime. To that end, the JBACE must be consulted on proposed laws, regulations, policies or other measures that may affect the regime, including land use regulations.


The JBACE may recommend changes to make these proposals compatible with the guiding principles of the regime set forth in Section 22 of the JBNQA. These principles, which are to be given due consideration by the responsible governments and committees, provide for, among other things, special status and involvement of the Cree people and protection of the rights and guarantees of the Cree people established by and in accordance with the Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Regime of the JBNQA.

The JBACE is responsible for the administrative supervision of the Evaluating Committee (COMEV).² If deemed necessary, the Evaluating Committee may recommend that a development project be submitted to the impact assessment and review procedure provided for in Section 22. Where this is the case, COMEV issues directives to the proponent regarding the extent of impact assessment required for the project. The procedure aims to minimize the negative impacts of development on Native people and wildlife resources (JBNQA; sub-paragraph 22.2.2 b).

Upon request, the Advisory Committee provides the local Cree government with technical and scientific information, advice or technical assistance, which it obtains from the appropriate government agencies (paragraph 22.3.33). As well, the JBACE transmits its decisions and recommendations to the governments, government corporations operating in the Territory and the committees established by the JBNQA for appropriate action. Every year, the JBACE submits a report of its activities to the Agreement signatories.

THE JBACE HAS STATED THAT IT WAS MAINLY PREOCCUPIED BY THE LACK OF CONSULTATION WITH RESPECT TO REGIONAL FORESTRY COMMISSIONS.

In 2005, the JBACE tooled itself with a strategic plan and it is within the context of this plan that it furthered its reflection on the following issues: a review of the JBNQA's Section 22 Schedules (chap. II of the EQA, Schedules A & B), integrated waste management and land use planning. Also, it has undertaken a study of the impacts of climate change on the Territory.

The Committee also continued its implementation of a series of 12 recommendations intended to enhance stakeholder participation in the assessment and review procedure concerning projects slated for Category I lands. These were elaborated in 2005-2006 after observing compliance problems in the application of the process.

Also, the Committee undertook to remedy the existing deficiencies in the structures dealing with land use planning issues. The JBACE has stated that it was mainly preoccupied by the lack of consultation with respect to regional forestry commissions. It also intervened in the legislative amendments proposed by the government concerning the provisions governing the establishment of protected areas.

HIGHLIGHTS (CONT'D)

1. THE ASSESSMENT AND REVIEW PROCEDURE

A. COMPLIANCE WITH THE PROCEDURE

A delegation from the JBACE met with Local Environment Administrators (LEA) in order to validate the recommendations³ adopted to enhance the application of the procedure to Category I lands⁴. Indeed, the LEA agreed on the need for greater involvement by the local administrations in the application of the procedure.

Following this consultation, the JBACE presented its recommendations to the Chiefs and members of the Grand Council of the Crees (GCC). The latter, while expressing their interest, suggested a number of measures aiming to enhance the application of the procedure, of which a better sort of the projects subjected or exempted from said procedure. The implementation of these recommendations also depends on the governments of Canada and Québec.

B. REVISION OF SCHEDULES 1 ET 2

With the view of acting on a provision of the JBNQA calling for a revision, every 5 years, of the lists of projects included in Section 22, the JBACE has initiated a structured approach, first consisting in collecting data regarding the processing of the projects submitted to the assessment and review procedure. This data was then analysed and considered in the elaboration of a preliminary version of the revised lists, which lists took into account technological changes, the current state of knowledge and the need to make the procedure more efficient.

After having held a work session with the members of the committees directly involved in the application of the procedure (COMEV, COMEX and COFEX-South), the JBACE intends to send its recommendations for a revision of Schedules 1 and 2 to the concerned parties sometime soon.

C. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND LANGUAGE OF THE DOCUMENTATION

The JBACE has written the Provincial Administrator in order to apprise her of the Oujé-Bougoumou and Waswanipi Crees' preoccupations concerning the documents, often available in French only, regarding the Chapais pork production and processing project. Given the soon to be held public hearings on this project, the JBACE requested of the Provincial Administrator that the appropriate conditions be in place for the participation of the communities of Oujé-Bougoumou and Waswanipi. The Administrator replied that she was favourable to this request and indicated that certain documents relevant to the project were available in English.

2. INTEGRATED RESIDUAL MATERIALS MANAGEMENT

In 2005-2006, the JBACE called on the Ministère du Développement durable, de l'Environnement et des Parcs (MDDEP) to encourage access to recycling programs and defer the application of the prohibition on burning in trench landfills on the James Bay Territory. Indeed, the JBACE is of the opinion that prohibiting burning will result in a substantial reduction in the useful life of trench landfills in the absence of efficient recycling programs. That is why the MDDEP has suggested the establishment of a multipartite work group.

The work group, comprised of representatives of the MDDEP's Service des matières résiduelles and regional stakeholders, conducted, among other initiatives, an on-site visit which allowed a few people to see for themselves the James Bay residual materials management infrastructures, of which an incinerator as well as certain ongoing recycling initiatives.

3. LAND USE PLANNING

A. ELABORATION OF AN APPROACH WITH RESPECT TO LAND USE

Given the deficiencies observed in territorial planning, the JBACE has called on the Standing Liaison Committee, whose mandate it is to solve any disagreements arising from the application of the JBNQA and the Agreement Concerning a New Relationship Between Québec and the Crees (ANRQC).

The JBACE has suggested that the Standing Liaison Committee establish a multipartite working group to elaborate an approach for a land use plan. Such a project would satisfy one of the essential conditions for a successful territorial planning, namely the involvement from the outset of all stakeholders.

B. PROPOSED REGIONAL FORESTRY COMMISSION

The JBACE has written the Ministère des Ressources naturelles et de la Faune (MRNF) concerning the difficulties apprehended following the filing of a proposal for a regional forestry commission by the Conférence régionale des élus de la Baie James (CRÉBJ). The Conference has prepared its proposal on the basis of a MRNF program adopted in 2005. According to the JBACE, the proposed commission does not comply with the conditions for Cree participation under the JBNQA. Also, the mandate of the proposed commission is redundant as regards the study mechanism of the forestry management plans already provided for under the JBNQA and the ANRQC.

That is why the JBACE has requested that the program establishing regional forestry commissions be adapted to take into account the principles of Native participation set forth in the JBNQA. In addition, the JBACE extended an invitation to the MRNF to present its program to the Standing Liaison Committee. Its invitation has been accepted and all that remains is for a date to be agreed upon.

4. GENERAL FORESTRY MANAGEMENT PLANS (GFMP)

The filing of the draft GFMP for the period 2008-2033 is expected by June 2007. In respect of its mandate, the JBACE is committed to analyse and, if need be, comment upon the GFMP before their adoption by the MRNF.

Since 2002, the ANRQC has provided new mechanisms to study the plans. Consequently, it was up to the JBACE to examine its mandate in the forestry domain in order to avoid any redundancies with respect to the work to be carried out by ANRQC agencies, notably the Cree-Québec Forestry Board (CQFB). As a result, the JBACE has adopted orientations for the study of GFMP based on the guiding principles of the environmental and social protection regime, for instance as regards participation by the Cree and the impacts on the social environment.

5. CLIMATE CHANGES

Given the apparent lack of studies concerning the consequences of climate changes on the James Bay Territory, the JBACE sponsored a report on the state of knowledge in this domain. The report is intended to raise awareness among the JBACE and other interested organizations, notably the Cree communities, as regards the anticipated consequences, the ongoing studies of these questions and the deficiencies in information to be further explored. Also, the JBACE intends to prepare a series of orientations in terms of policies dealing with climate changes.

HIGHLIGHTS (CONT'D)

6. PROTECTED AREAS

A. PROPOSALS FOR PARKS, BIODIVERSITY RESERVES AND AQUATIC RESERVES

The JBACE supports the implementation of the Québec strategy on protected areas and favours the application to the James Bay Territory of the international criteria for the conservation of ecosystems. As of now, the planned park, seven biodiversity reserves and two aquatic reserves represent less than 4% of the territory's total area.

That is why the JBACE has requested of the MDDEP that it tool the James Bay Territory with a strategy for the implementation of protected areas given the development projects that are planned.

B. DRAFT LEGISLATIVE AMENDMENTS

Within a brief filed on the occasion of proposed modifications to the Parks Act and the Natural Heritage Conservation Act⁵, the JBACE underlined the necessity to assure a distinct consultation of Native organizations with respect to the contents of the conservation plans.

However, the JBACE has indicated its support of the harmonization mechanism with the assessment and review procedure under the JBNQA for the public hearings held under the Parks Act. The Government of Québec has not yet adopted these legislative modifications.

7. WASTEWATER MANAGEMENT

The JBACE intends to examine the draft strategy and regulations on wastewater management expected within the coming year. A presentation by Environment Canada on these questions afforded members of the JBACE an opportunity to submit their preliminary comments.

CONCLUSION

2006-2007 will have been a watershed year in terms of key issues. After having identified as priorities improvements in the assessment and review procedure as well as in the sustainable management of residual materials, following up on these issues has been critical.

In 2006-2007, meetings with Local Environment Administrators (LEA) and then with the Council-Board of the Grand Council of the Crees have resulted in a renewed focus on the recommendations established in 2006 pertaining to the assessment and review procedure for Category I lands. Moreover, a structured action plan has led to the formulation of a proposal for reviewed lists of subjected and exempted projects (Schedules 1 and 2) to be presented shortly to the parties for their approval.

In terms of the management of residual materials, the JBACE has cooperated closely with the Cree First Nations, in particular Wemindji, in order to facilitate recycling and recuperation initiatives. The involvement of new partners contributing to these efforts, through the work group on the integrated management of residual materials, is certainly cause for optimism in terms of progress in regulations and programs.

This type of partnership should facilitate the attainment of the strategic orientations set by the JBACE. The implementation of these orientations will be pursued over the coming year.

8. CONTRACTUAL COMMITMENT

The governments of Canada and Québec and the Cree Regional Authority¹ grant an annual subsidy of \$251 000 to the JAMES BAY ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON THE ENVIRONMENT.
